SEED Study: Self-reported evaluation of the adverse effects of dexamethasone

The SEED study team are currently in the process of cleaning the SEED data in preparation for the final analysis. All queries have now been placed on the data within OpenClinica and the site study coordinators are busy answering the queries. The study was formally closed to recruitment on 31 October 2013 with the following recruitment figures:

STUDY & TRIAL UPDATES

CABARET Study: A randomised phase II study of Carboplatin and Bevacizumab in Recurrent Glioblastoma Multiforme (GBM)

Following the presentation of preliminary progression-free survival data at ASCO 2013, the CABARET team are focusing on final data cleaning in preparation for analysis. The central radiology review of MRI scans has been completed for all patients who have ceased treatment.

Analysis of the tumour and blood samples collected from patients who participated in the translational sub-study has also commenced, and we look forward to results of these analyses becoming available in 2014.

In regards to the current status of CABARET patients, the majority of patients are now deceased, with only 4 remaining on treatment (Part 1) and 4 patients in follow-up. No patients are currently on Part 2 treatment. A summary of the current status of patients on the trial is to the right.

CATNON (EORTC 26053-22054): Phase III trial on concurrent and adjuvant Temozolomide chemotherapy in non-1p/19q deleted anaplastic glioma

Since the last newsletter, the CATNON study has reached over 50% of the target accrual for Australian sites, and registered its 1,000th patient internationally on 8 November 2013. This is a major milestone, and the international sponsor the EORTC are confident that with the 9 - 10 patients being randomised globally each month, CATNON will successfully complete enrollment in two years from now. To date we have activated 12 Australian sites and work is continuing to activate Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital.

The CATNON team at the CTC are working to transition to site-performed registrations and randomisations in 2014. This will streamline the process and improve time efficiency for both site staff and the team at the CTC.

The site coordinators continue to do a fantastic job in

submitting the case report forms and responding to queries. The high standard of data from Australian sites continues to be acknowledged by the EORTC.

Joe Levitt will no longer be the CATNON Trial Coordinator effective 9 December 2013. He would like to thank everyone on the CATNON team for their help and support during his time in this role, particularly Kate Sawkins, Project Manager. Joe has enjoyed his time working with the team and wishes them every success going forward. Joe will be replaced by Lisa Bailey, who is returning to the CTC following maternity leave.

STUDY & TRIAL UPDATES

Patterns of Care Study of Adult Medulloblastoma

In collaboration with other clinicians, the COGNO clinical research fellow, Dr Rasha Cosman, undertook a survey of patterns of care in adult medulloblastoma. This was launched internationally in November 2012 and the results were presented, in poster format, at the American Society of Clinical Oncology annual meeting in Chicago in June 2013. This was also presented during COGNO's 2013 ASM session addressing challenges of neuro-oncology in the young adult. This is currently being prepared for publishing.

NEW CONCEPTS

Since the last newsletter, three new concepts have been considered by the COGNO Scientific Advisory Committee (SAC) with consensus that all three be either further developed or proceed as a study -

- Microglia: a new treatment target in gliomas (further development)
- How do people with recurrent glioma and their partners sleep? (further development)
- Remembering in patients with brain tumours and metastases: what tools do health professionals use when communicating with patients (*study to proceed*).

During the recent COGNO ASM, SAC held a face-to-face meeting which was open to COGNO members. Members attending had the opportunity to hear about COGNO's studies (including co-badged studies), previously approved concepts, as well as non-COGNO neuro-oncology projects. The SAC meeting benefited greatly from the contribution and insights of the four ASM international guest speakers, Professors Peter Burger, Mitch Berger, Jan Buckner and A/Prof James Perry.

WORKING GROUPS

The following working groups continued to progress, with the support and assistance of COGNO clinical research fellow, Rasha Cosman:

- CALD study With the recognition of the challenges that health professionals meet with in delivering health services to patients of culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) background, the working group has focussed on better understanding these challenges and in particular those impeding participation in clinical trials. A manuscript is under way.
- Exercise study The role of exercise in improving outcomes for patients suffering from cancer is increasingly being studied. Aiming to define its role in the management of brain cancer patients, a trial concept is being developed to investigate this.
- Sleep study a systematic review of sleep disorders in adult patients with brain tumours is being undertaken. It is hoped that this will assist in identifying areas in need of further investigation where COGNO can contribute to the global body of knowledge in this topic.
